10/10/2011	<p>My name is Matt Hamilton and I live in Graham Washington. I would like to comment on the various maps at my Congressional District level and Legislative level. Right now I am in favor of the Gorton Map at the Congressional level and at the Legislative level I prefer a modified Foster/Gorton map. I was seeking a map or a combination of maps that keeps Graham together. When I testify on Tuesday I will bring maps of the Graham Community plan with me. So you may know exactly where the Pierce County Council has established the Community of Graham. Under the Growth Management Act of 1995 unincorporated communities were given a voice by establishing community plans. Pierce county spent a half million dollars and citizens such as myself worked 4 years to craft a community plan for Graham. Back in 1995 we had barely 8,000 people in fact by the year 2000 we barely had 12,000. But builders building on what is called "Old Dog Developments" that is to say developments recorded prior to the enactment of the Growth Management Act of 1995 they could build outside the growth management line. And build they did, a little history of our location. Because we are 4 blocks outside the Growth Management Line we could never become a city or even a town, the bar is simply set too high. Our population as of the 2010 Census is at 35,000 people. This is why the 2nd Legislative District had 26,400 people beyond the average. We are the most under-represented people per person in Washington State. Our new Graham Kapowsin High School is at beyond the Capacity at 1,900 students and we need a new one. Our local School District has purchased 100 acres of land at 70th and 224th to build a new High School. I chaired the commission to change the zoning of that land so that a new high school could be built. That means when both High Schools are full we will have 2 4A Schools just 40 blocks apart. Can any other part of Washington State claim such growth? Children regardless of the economy will still have children and we must plan for this growth. Future growth will occur in Graham. We have 6,000 Un-built lots ,with cities in Pierce County reluctant to accept the infill growth required of them by the Growth Management Act, massive growth will occur once again in Graham. We have become the pressure relief vavle for Pierce County. With all this growth in people should the representation follow? Do the unincorporated people of Graham have the same access to Federal and State funding and grants? What bothers me the most is Graham does not appear on any of your maps. Yet towns as small as 120 do, why is that? At the Pierce County Council level we were divided East and West. 10/10/2011	<p>Dear Redistricting Commissioners: I am a leader in the 2nd Legislative district. I've been in both parties. I am currently on the Bethel school board. I recognize the 2nd LD is huge and must be reduced. Our county failed us here. Here are my thoughts on redistricting, as one who follows the legislative process fairly closely.</p> <p>1) I would like to see the majority of the Bethel school district in one legislative and congressional district. As a rural district, we need to have a strong base of representation, not a diluted one.</p> <p>2) As a community volunteer, I prefer not to have the suburban, heavily populated communities divided. Most of these communities have state highways running through them. What do these maps ALL do? They divide areas using state highways, not good, bad for communities. When an area is only represented by a group of volunteers, it's hard for them to lobby multiple offices representing the area. It usually results in being ignored or quick burnout for the volunteers, then no connections are established at all with the representation and they run amok with their leadership.</p> <p>Congressional Maps Huff: Takes too many districts across the Cascades Gorton: Same problem with "over the mountains" districts, also a problem with a bizarre section of the 3rd CD jutting up into south Pierce County (2nd LD), essentially disenfranchising them. Foster: Mostly reasonable, but throwing the middle of Pierce County in with the Washington coast is strange and unreasonable. Ceis: I believe this is the best of the Congressional maps, the CD's are compact and contiguous.</p> <p>Legislative Maps Huff: Spits the 2nd LD in a manner that one cannot drive from east to west without going through a different district. This splits the community of Spanaway 4 ways, totally unacceptable. Gorton: Ditto the above. There are no Nisqually River crossing between McKenna and Elbe. There is one intersection here in the former 2nd LD with 4 different legislative districts at the center of a community. Awful. Imagine the sign waving opportunities, total eye pollution. Foster: The 2nd LD looks the same, but all the Democratic votes are stripped from it in this map. Having it turned 65% Republican concerns me. Ceis: At first I thought, what the heck do Anderson and McNeil Islands have in common with the 2nd LD? Then I realized this is a Hudson Bay Company map. The 2nd LD here is a really historic district from the formation of Washington Territory. Thanks for letting me comment.
