

- **We support a unified Pasco.** All of the commissioners said during the release of the maps that keeping cities together is a priority. However, two of the four maps cut Pasco—with its large Latino and immigrant population—into two different districts. Cutting Pasco in half will only dilute the power of the large Latino and immigrants populations in the city.
- **We support the creation of “Majority Minority” state legislative districts.** As a result, we urge you to create three majority people of color state legislative districts in King County, one in Tacoma and the majority Latino state legislative district in Yakima.

As Commissioner Huff mentioned in his release of the maps, it is important for commissioners to listen to the “will of the people.” We deeply believe that drawing the lines in the manner we have outlined will ensure fair representation of immigrant communities and communities of color in our area and across Washington State.
